

DIRECTIVE 2008-48

TO: Certain County Boards of Elections

RE: New filing of petition on proposed referendum on Sub. H.B. 545

As previously noted in Directive 2008-45, a petition was filed with the Secretary of State's office by persons seeking to file a referendum petition against Sub. H.B. 545 of the 127th General Assembly. However, the Attorney General determined the summary contained on the petition was not a fair and truthful summary.

Therefore, pursuant to R.C. 3519.01(B)(1), the persons seeking to file a referendum petition against Sub. H.B. 545 of the 127th General Assembly filed a new petition with the Secretary of State's office. Enclosed are part petitions containing signatures that must be examined to determine the number of registered voters who signed each part petition. Please read this directive and the accompanying instructions carefully before you start your examination of the signatures.

Checking the petitions:

- Circulator signatures: You must invalidate any part petition that was circulated by a person who has been convicted of a felony under the laws of this state, any other state or the United States. To verify whether a circulator has been convicted of a felony, you may seek the assistance of your county clerk of courts.
- Petition signatures: Each person who signs a petition paper must be a qualified elector of the county in which the petition paper was circulated as of the date the petition is examined by the board. (R.C. 3519.15) If the part petition contains signatures from another county, the part petition is still valid, but only signatures from your county shall be counted. The signatures from outside your county are invalid. (R. C. 3519.10)

Returning the petitions:

- As soon as you certify these part petitions, **please return the completed form and all petitions to the Secretary of State's office. Certification and return of the petitions and form must be received by the Secretary of State's office no later than July 10, 2008.**
- You must deliver these part petitions to the Secretary of State's office either in person or by a method that provides for tracking of delivery (e.g. certified U.S. mail, Post Office Express Mail, UPS, or FedEx).
