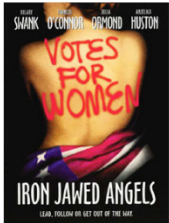


CELEBRATING THE CENTENNIAL: HONORING THE 19th AMENDMENT

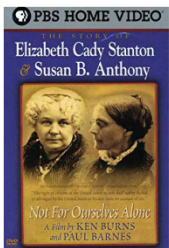

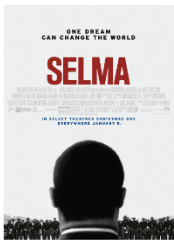
***Iron Jawed Angels*, directed by Katja von Garnier (HBO Films, 2004)**

An American historical drama starring Hilary Swank as suffragist leader Alice Paul, with Frances O'Connor as activist Lucy Burns and Angelica Huston as Carrie Chapman Catt. The film raises interesting questions about alliances and rivalries over questions of tactics as well as personal style in the American woman suffrage movement.



***Not for Ourselves Alone*, directed by Ken Burns (Florentine Films and WETA, c2019, c1999)**

This two-part film tells the story of the woman suffrage movement, with a particular focus on Susan B. Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton. Want to delve deeper? The companion book has excellent photographs and a good narrative to expand on the storylines covered on-screen.



***Selma*, directed by Ava DuVernay (Paramount Pictures, 2015)**

Starring David Oyelowo as Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., this film is heavily based on the historic 1965 voting rights marches from Selma to Montgomery, Alabama. Although the Voting Rights Act of 1965 outlawed discriminatory voting practices, black women and men were still being denied access to the polls. This film shines light on some of the black women leaders who were a part of the organizing and mobilizing in the deep South for actualization of universal suffrage.
